## How CACFP helps child care providers



For licensed child care providers, CACFP can provide meal reimbursements for the foods they provide to the children in their care. The program helps reduce child care costs while ensuring children receive healthy, nutritious meals. Eligible child care providers are given

cash reimbursement for serving meals that meet Federal nutritional guidelines, outlined in the CACFP meal pattern. The CACFP program is available for Registered Family and Group Child Care Programs, covering counties on the south eastern side of the state. # **Community Spotlight: Yellowstone CoC**

"There are so many reasons someone may become unhoused. It is important to ensure we are doing all we can as a community to work together and make the process of getting housed easy, trauma-informed, and client-centered."

The Yellowstone County Continuum of Care (CoC) has been vital in providing support for some of the most vulnerable populations in our community. CoC partners consist of local organizations that incredibly passionate about serving people who are unhoused and work hard every day to provide services to this community. The CoC's role is to promote community-wide commitment to the goal of ending homelessness and are significantly proactive of this pursuit.

In 2024, 374 people were successfully housed through the CoC's Coordinated Entry System. This entry system includes 21 agencies and 36 Client Advocates actively attending case conferencing every other Thursday. Case managers meet during case conferencing and work together to house our community's most vulnerable population.

The coalition is currently working on facilitating conversations about Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH). Permanent supportive housing is a model used to house people facing chronic homelessness. In combination with on-site services like mental health counseling, substance use counseling, and crisis stabilization, tenants in PSH can get the support they need to maintain successful housing.

Yellowstone CoC is constantly working to create helpful resources for the unhoused population. We are incredibly proud to partner with them. Visit yellowstonecoc.org to learn more about this amazing organization and its upcoming initiatives!
